By means of the Public Art Program, the Arts and Cultural Heritage Division assists the Park Planning & Environmental Stewardship Division by serving as the advisor and project manager for public art projects undertaken through the Capital Improvement Fund. Furthermore, active engagement and participation by community stakeholders are a vital component of all Department of Parks and Recreation public art projects. 

ART ON THE TRAILS

The Art on the Trails program recycles and repurposes materials found in nature, such as downed trees and other natural materials, and changes them into sculptures, park benches, or other artistic elements. The sculptures reflect native wildlife and the local environment of the various trails. Using these natural materials for art installations saves them from landfills. Visitors can see how the sculpture changes as it decays over the years. Working with a master artist, tree crews, naturalists, and park rangers, young people learn the importance of maintaining and protecting the environment by creating art from recycled materials.

YOUNG ARTISTS APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

The Young Artists Apprenticeship Program (YAAP) is an exciting and enriching initiative designed to ignite creativity, foster artistic talent, and provide hands-on learning experiences for young aspiring artists within Prince George's County. This program is tailored for passionate individuals aged 16-24 who are eager to explore and develop their artistic skills in a supportive and collaborative environment. Participating YAAP artists will be mentored and guided by a professional artist/teacher through various site-specific projects, including but not limited to indoor and outdoor murals, sculptural installations. Art on the Trails Program projects, and many others. These projects will be located throughout the Department of Parks and Recreation properties, including buildings, trails, gardens, grounds, and parklands.



MURAL PROGRAM

The Mural Program aims to enhance the facilities and grounds owned and operated by the Department of Parks and Recreation. Recent projects at Columbia Park Community Center and Cedar Heights Community Center focused on community participation and engagement through focus groups, workshops, and a community-created mural. The program's goal is to support local artists who have roots within the Maryland, District of Columbia, and Virginia region. The future vision for the program is to expand its reach over the nine legislative districts within Prince George's County. The Mural Program hopes to ensure that beautiful artwork can be experienced and accessed across the county to all who live and visit here.



VISUAL ARTS PROGRAM

Art purchases made through these means not only make strides toward supporting the vitality of Prince George's County's arts and cultural environment but also help to directly support the livelihood of county artists. Public art reflects a community's unique history, culture, and values, fostering a sense of belonging, bringing residents together, and strengthening community bonds. The Department's program provides positive environments for Department employees and visitors alike. There are over 220 works of art in the M-NCPPC's growing, permanent Visual Arts Collection. In addition to producing rotating exhibitions and longer-term art displays, the Visual Arts Program spearheads two major annual summer projects - the Black History Month Poster Teen Internship and the Hispanic Heritage Celebration Poster Teen Internship. Currently, these projects partner with Pyramid Atlantic Art Center to produce the unique prints that are transformed into much sought-after posters with a combined distribution level of almost 20,000 Black History Month and Hispanic Heritage posters. It is important to note that all programs, events, and opportunities, including exhibitions, lectures, receptions, and workshops provided by the Visual Arts Program of the Department's Arts and Cultural Heritage Division, are free to artists and the public. 
Celebrate Africa Festival

SPACES TO PERFORM AND REHEARSE

Prince George's Dance Studio

The Prince George's Dance Studio, located in The Clarice at the University of Maryland, is operated by the Department of Parks and Recreation. The studio has a sprung floor, mirrors, portable barres, and an upright piano. The studio is suitable for dance and drama rehearsals, auditions, and workshops, and is available to rent by local artists and arts organizations solely for performing arts activities. Rent Credit at The Clarice

M-NCPPC provides financial assistance to Prince George's County non-profit arts organizations for rental expenses incurred when holding performances at The Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center. Prince George's County-based organizations that rent performance space through M-NCPPC are eligible for venue rental at the campus room rate and can apply to M-NCPPC for rent credit to offset their expenses based on the total estimated cost of the performance. The Clarice staff are responsible for scheduling events and determining rental estimates.

The following conditions apply to organizations requesting space through M-NCPPC:

- Only non-profit organizations in Prince George's County,
 Maryland, can apply for the M-NCPPC rent credit.
- Organizations must provide proof of 501(c)
 (3) status to M-NCPPC and a copy of their bylaws to the M-NCPPC Arts Coordinator.
- Organizations must request rental space from The Clarice Scheduling Office and abide by The Clarice's policies outlined in the rental contract.
- Rent credit is not available for receptions, food served during an event, ticketing fees, or rental of special equipment.

The John Addison Concert Hall: The John Addison Concert Hall was designed in the tradition of a European concert hall to present acoustic music by small chamber ensembles. The Concert Hall has no overhead pipes or front-stage curtains. A black curtain in the back separates the backstage areas. Capacity: 220



Dance Studio: Located on the second floor, accessible by stairs or elevator, the climate-controlled professional dance studio space is 31' 6" x 54' 9.5" with three mirrored and barred walls and a hardwood dance floor. The studio comes with a receiver connected to a speaker system. You may connect to a playback device via Bluetooth or cable. The studio accommodates 30-50 participants.






Qrcky: Bereft of Color

PRINCE GEORGE'S PUBLICK PLAYHOUSE

The Publick Playhouse opened in 1947 as the Cheverly Theatre, the flagship of the Sidney Lust chain of movie houses. Designed in the Art Deco style by John Eberson, it was one of the first public spaces in the area to have air conditioning. In the late 1960s, the theatre fell into decline and closed. In 1975, The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission acquired the property and began extensive restoration, preserving many of the art deco elements of the building. In 1977, the building re-opened as the Prince George's Publick Playhouse for the Performing Arts, and since then has been a superior cultural resource that presents outstanding performances, classes, and art exhibitions for all ages.


